

WATER ON EARTH

WHAT IS WATER POLLUTION?

Water pollution occurs when harmful substances—often chemicals or microorganisms—contaminate a stream, river, lake, ocean, aguifer, or other body of water, degrading water quality and rendering it toxic to humans or the environment. There are two main types are Point Source and Non-Point Source Pollution:

Point Source is when contamination originates from a single source. Like wastewater discharged legally or illegally, oil refinery, or wastewater treatment facility, as well as contamination from leaking septic systems, chemical and oil spills, and illegal dumping. The EPA regulates point source pollution by establishing limits on what can be discharged by a facility directly into a body of water. While point source pollution originates from a specific place, it can affect miles of waterways and ocean.

Non-Point Source (NPS) is contamination derived from diffuse sources. These may include agricultural or stormwater runoff or debris blown into waterways from land. NPS is the leading cause of water pollution in U.S. waters, but it's difficult to regulate, since there's no single, identifiable culprit.

HOW TO HELP PREVENT WATER POLLUTION

There are many ways to help prevent water pollution from small to large:

You can go green and use more environmentally friendly products for cleaning.

Go plastic free, plastic pollutes water also.

Do not litter or even clean up litter while out for a walk. Always dispose of trash properly.

Clean up pet waste.

Implement stormwater management to your property like a rain barrel, planting a tree, or creating a rain garden to help manage stormwater runoff.

Volunteer to help clean up our cities and water ways.
